

MEAM survey trip – Saturday February 19, 2022

After five consecutively cancelled survey trips in 2022 (damn you, weather!), it was finally meant to happen: The first MEAM survey of the year! Reports on visibility in the area were not very encouraging, predicting a handful of meters visibility (at best!) and unfavourable increases in wind speeds in the arvo. But, that was a better forecast than we've ever had in 2022, so we went for it! After a splendidly calm and uncomplicated organisational prelude, we all met up at the (very busy!) Mooloolaba boat ramp for a timely departure to the outer Gneering. Specifically, we wanted to give a site called 'Shellacey' a go. The site, located about halfway out on the outer Gneering, is known by local operators for its exquisite nudibranch abundance and diversity as well as interesting reef structure and rich coral cover. And, given the poor predictions, conditions were likely to be best further out rather than around Mudjimba Island. However, this also meant that we had to a survey at 16-17m depth, almost twice as deep as the usual transects! We, therefore, decided to do one transect in two lots, a wise decision as it turned out that we were indeed hitting close to the limits of our gas consumption and no-deco times. Conditions were

surprisingly good with little swell, 5-7m vis and only a moderate amount of current towards the end of the survey with plenty of sunshine. The team worked like a well-oiled machine and we found ourselves back at the shed, with everything cleaned and packed away at 4.30pm, what an amazing operation!

We had a hell of a good time with a great & relaxed atmosphere, lots of smiles and laughter and everybody being visibly excited about being out and about in the ocean again! Karen was dearly missed and Shannon was awfully pale and quiet during the surface interval (;)). Thanks to everybody for a fantastic trip, this is what we're doing it for! May the next trip be just around the corner! -Cedric

Byron Bay camping & diving trip – February 18-20, 2021

Looking back to less crazy days (weather-wise), we got to spend a mostly sunny weekend (18th-20th of Feb) along the beautiful coastline of Byron Bay. To our turtle-lover's delight we got to see a huge one that decided to swim past us after we had admired it just sitting in a crevice. That left us some time in the arvo to relax a bit before going to explore Byron's night life (with some of us basically dancing rather than walking about;).
